**Cultural Sensitivity in Communication:** Schools should make efforts to communicate with parents in a culturally sensitive manner,

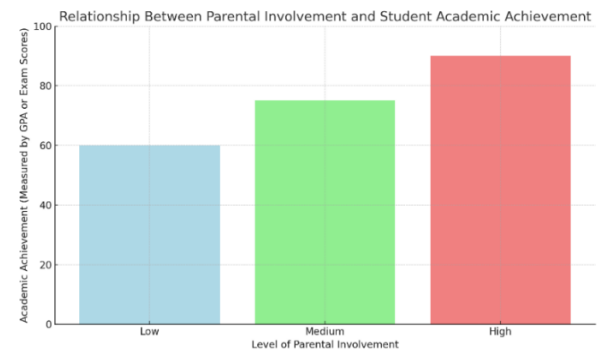
using language and messaging that resonates with their values and beliefs. This could include offering translated materials or hosting events that reflect the cultural diversity of the student body.
